US Public School Enrollment, 2020–2021: 49.4 Million Students

What is a Specific Learning Disability (SLD)?

An SLD is a brain-based disorder that affects an individual's ability to read, write, and do math (e.g., dyslexia, dysgraphia, and dyscalculia). Students identified with SLD receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), a law that provides a free and appropriate public education to children with disabilities. Of the 13th of the U.S. school-age population who received disability services under IDEA in the 2020–2021 academic year, 34th received services for SLD as the primary disability.


